



Tour of Lake Orta



Cult tour around the Lake and the Isle of San Giulio

It is a very well-known and popular ride, especially among foreign guests.

The reasons for its success are diverse, from lake to island, from tower to sanctuary...along an arterial road with low road traffic.

The proposed departure is from the **Omegna Train Station** and the travel **direction counterclockwise**: from North to West to taste more slowly the lake at the foot of **Monte Zuoli**, from where the rainbows of **the Giardini della Torta in Cielo** of Rodarian memory can be seen. Heading up toward Nonio, the traditional and enchanting view of the lake is joined by the novelty of the **ZIPLine**, which, starting from the first hairpin bend toward the cat town, dives down to the lake at **"la Boschina**," offering enthusiasts seconds of pure adrenaline.

Upon reaching **Brolo**, the first part of the climb ends, as does the view of the lake.

After a short flat section, we resume a gentle climb to the entrance of **Nonio**, passing at the foot of the always joyful kindergarten.

Downhill near the church and a short descent to the soccer field, a flat section followed by a small climb to Cesara with a fountain on the right. Before reaching **Cesara**, we notice signs praising **Filippo Ganna**, the champion everyone knows whose mother is from Omegna and his relatives from these areas.

Leaving Cesara, a town of peace (in name and fact), we descend to the **Valley of the Plin** (**Pellino**), the stream that runs down from Arola to the border with Valsesia.

Here, besides cows, wild boars, and foxes, it is easy to come across the grey heron, which checks the fish level in the stream.

The Plìn Valley enjoys only a few hours of sunshine a day, and because of this, there is always a negative temperature swing of a few degrees: pleasant in good weather, a little less so in winter. As the Pellino drops steeply over Pella and Lake Orta, the road continues toward **Alzo**. At the entrance to the village, we recommend the **ring road** on the right. Still, for those who want to get to know the small village and its central square with a view of the lake better, we recommend going straight ahead, descending to the main town, taking a detour to Ronco, returning to Pella and continuing on to **San Maurizio d'Opaglio**, the **capital of the tap**.



Here, the upstream road rejoins the lake road. Toward the exit of the village, at a couple of roundabouts, we get a sense of how much attention the local community devotes to the object that has given it so much prosperity, even to the point of dedicating an exciting museum to it.

As we leave San Maurizio d'Opaglio, the charming **little church of Santa Maria di Luzzara** stands out in a small clearing on the left.

The road continues flat until **Gozzano**, passing alongside the local soccer field, passing two roundabouts, flanking a large brownfield site, and finally coming to a third roundabout that is the turning point of our route. From here, the direction of travel changes, going up toward Lake Orta from south to north.

The descent to the lake begins shortly after the junction with another attraction: the **Buccione Tower**, which requires a small detour of 3 km on a slight incline.

Continuing straight on, after a series of downhill curves tackled with due caution, one enters the territory of Orta San Giulio, passing through the localities of **Miami** (beach area) and **Imolo** before tackling the little climb made famous by the stage finish of the **Giro d'Italia** won by Bertoglio in **1975**.

At the roundabout (which you didn't have in Bertoglio's days) placed at the end of the short ascent, we have a choice between a few hours to devote to the nearby **Sacro Monte**, a UNESCO heritage site, Orta and its island, or to continue straight on to the other riparian town of **Pettenasco**.

The one that leads from the Orta roundabout to **Tortirogno** (the lake outlet of Miasino) is the last section with variations in gradients of the entire tour; from now on, it is just a flat path between lake and mountain, with several lakeside cottages (one above all the one at **Punta di Crabbia** of the great chef Antonino Cannavacciuolo), docks and landings for boats and divers.

After this latter location, the road continues close to the **Domodossola-Novara railway line**, just a few meters from the lake.

The arrival in Omegna takes place near the roundabout in **Borca**, where for several years, some characters from the stories of **Gianni Rodari**, who was born in the Cusio capital from a modest family of bakers and is known throughout the world above all for his writings aimed at young children, full of imagination, irony and much more. Over the years, the city has dedicated a park, a toy library, and, from 2021, a museum to him, all of which are worth visiting by young and old alike.









TECHNICAL ASPECTS

Cycling tour, well known to enthusiasts for its undulating route close to Lake Orta, in a natural and cultural environment full of charm and attractions.

Favorite training area of professional cycling champions such as Filippo Ganna. A 52/24 is more than enough.

POINTS OF INTEREST

If a critical issue should be highlighted, it is the **short descent** from the **Buccione junction** to the lake to be approached with some caution, mainly the first curve that is blind.
